Councils learn about planning reform

LOCAL councils explored the state government's proposed new planning reforms and what they mean for local communities at a seminar on Friday in Port Lincoln.

Facilitated by KelledyJones Lawyers together with Adelaide planning firm Development Answers, participants included council chief executives, officers and elected members from the City of Port Lincoln, Wudinna, Elliston, Streaky Bay, Franklin Harbour, Lower Eyre Peninsula, Tumby Bay, Ceduna and Kimba district councils.

Victoria Shute from KelledyJones Lawyers said the government's proposed Bill to create a new planning system had "opportunities and challenges for councils and their communities."

"Our planning system affects every one of us in our everyday lives," she said.

"As councils are at the coal face of development in their community and administer a large part of the planning system, it is vital they are up-todate with the proposed new system."
